TWENTY-FOR 397TH PILOTS ATTAIN COMEAT DISTINCTION

Air Medel Recommendations Are Submitted To Group

USAF STATION 404, CHILBOLTON, Hents, UK-(April 1)-Twenty-four 'eager-beaver' pilots of the hard-hitting 597th Fighter Squadron have attained combat distinction, despite the fact that they became operational only slightly more than two weeks ago.

Recommendations for 24 Air Medals and seven Oak Leaf Obsters to this decoration have been submitted, through 568th Group Headquarters, to the Aunth Air Support Command for approval, it was revealed here today by the squadron operations office. Actual awarding of the medals and clusters will occur upon receipt or the approval.

- The Major Dossn't Stand Short -

Most apparent during these first operational weeks was the impossibility of keeping the 'old man' (he'll be 28 this summer) on the ground. As completely separate as sawerkrout and ice cream is Major Hassler and the 'swivel chair and desk' type of leaders. He flew every mission, has been officially credited with one damaged ME-109, and has chalked up eligibility for an Air Medal with two Cak Leaf Clusters. Also slated to receive the award and a pair of clusters for his work with this squadron is Captain Eugene M. Potter, an RAF Eagle Squadron and ETOUSA veteran before joining the organization last month. Potter is now assistant operations officer.

Operations Officer Back From Interesting Combat Tour

GHILSCHRON, Hants--(April 3, 1944)--Captain Hendall V. Hendricks, 397th Operations Officer and one of the squadron's 'hotter' pilots, talked to the squadron's enlisted personnel here today relative to his experiences while on detached service with a dive-bombing unit in Rely.

Weather conditions held the Captain grounded to about six brief missions during his stay in Il Duce's old stamping ground, eliminating the possibility of passing on much technical information. His detailed account of the conditions that are new come fronting troops stationed on the centinent, however, was a subject replacement of equivalent value to the men — who hope to set up housekeeping some place over there themselves before very long.

Making the trip itself in a 0-47 'Dekota', the Ceptain observed conditions in many sectors now under Allied compation, including Algiers, Oran, Casablanea and Maples. His report was of a favorable nature. Living conditions, food and the like are ample; in fast, good, considering the circumstances. Civilians, too, seem to be without urgent want, enjoying good food and dress —— especially the French girls, who, according to Ceptain Hendricks, are surprisingly attractive and well dressed for recidents of a war-torn nation.

Esserted 3-34's to Germany; Turned Back Serly

GHILBOLTON, Hents-(April 12, 1944)-Grovision of penetration support for the bease of Liberators enroute to targets in Germany was the purpose of the squadren's 16th operational mission.

Taking off from Chilbolton at 1143, the squadron joined a group formation, left the English coast at Deal, crossed the ennel and made landfall in at Misuport, Belg. Rendesyons

with the bembers, who were flying 35 to the box, was established slightly west of Brussels at 1310. The squadron accompanied the Liberators as far as Liege, where they turned back on a group recall after encountering bad veather and poor visibility. Heavy, assurate and intense flak was observed at Cotand.

In the squadren formation were IA Gol Mayors, group semander, Maj Perege, deputy nder, Maj Hassler, Captains Marini and Potter, First Lieutements Brown, O'Connell, Fry and Louges and Second Lieutenante Rosveld, Harlacher, Sharp, Beskield, Briscoll, Arps and Languaid. Second Lieutenante Sutcliffe and Dame flow as sparce, the latter filling in for Lieutenant Languald, who aborted when the glass coupling on his left wing tenk broke. Lieutenent Sutcliffe filled in in the 597th squadren.

Today's mission was the first for Lieutenent irps, who has been grounded with an ear ailment since the squadron become operational. Commenting on the experience,

SMASH MONTREUIL AREA IN DIVE BONDING SHOW

OHILBOLTON, Hanto-- (april 13, 1944)--Hoball targets southeast of Montraull, France, were the objective of severe dive bombings today from the 569th Fighter Group - the rele of the 397th in the event being the provision of top cover. Take-off from Ohilbolton was at 0910. They left the English coast at Dunganess, made landfall in at a point north of Bereit-sur-Mer, pounded the target and flow a straight source back to a landing strip at Hingston Bospulso, where they

refueled and reloaded bombs. In making their second trip of the day, they flow a straight course to the landfall out point of their first mission (South of Hardelot. France) and then turned northeast toward the target, which was located northeast of Desves, France. From the target area they flow northeast to Gravelines, then erosed the Charmal to South Foreland and returned home. Heather conditions were favorable and a minimum of flak was encountered.

"The Dombs hit in hige elusters throughout the entire target area, resulting in demage that was undoubtedly extensive and probably leveling the objective completely." commented Lightenant Hemilton.

Lieutement Languaid's version was similar: "...our position in today's foraation didn't enable much observation, but I did see enough to know that the bomb patterns were really effective --- the damage must have been terrifie!"

Equally optimistic as to the results was Lieutenent Arps, who made his second operational mission today and sommented: "We were too far away to see much of the actual results of the booking, but there were numerous puffs of smoke in the target area -- enough to indicate several sizoble explosions and considerable decays in general."

Participating in the mission, the squadron's 17th, were Major Massler, Captains Gibson, Kerini and Potter, First Lieutements Dare, Carlson and Fry, and Second Lieutements Sechtodd, Rosvold, Sutcliffs, Hamilton, Horlacher, Marko, Burney, Arps and languaid. it was a bresk of equivalent value for the casay. Flak that was heavy, mager and accurate was encountered at a point west of Abbeville; it was accurate, intense and heavy at Beauvaist light, inaccurate and meager south of Boulogne; heavy, intense and accurate at Boulogne and moderate at Le Treport. Three planes (Major Raceler's, Lisut. Corluca's and Lieut. Fry's) were damaged elightly.

"They were really out to get us today," Major Ressler commented, "The flak was terrific --- three everything at us but the kitchen sink, but they couldn't stop us.

We blow those trains up higher than a kite!"

"We hit those freight trains mighty hard," claimed Lieutenant Carleon, "...the damage was extensive, no doubt about it. I can one locomotive explode and blow all over the place. The freights provided good targets and we hit them while they were out in the open, laying off while they were in stations so as not to murt any French

civilians. Plenty of flak, but we all come through CK."

Captain Marini's version was not far different: "We all had a hellure lot of fun today -- our best mission to date. We blow those. Hazi freights sky high. And they didn't like it very well, either - them bushels of flak at us and some of our ships got protty well scratched up, but we all got back CE and the boys will have our planes ready for temorrow, if we need 'en."

CHILBOLTON, Hants—(April 18)—Thirty-one 250-pound general purpose books that interrupted normal procedure and raised hell in general at energ-held marchalling yards was the squadron's birthday gift to Hitler today. SQUADRON FLIES FRACTICE GROUND SUPPORT MISSIONS OVER THE START BAY AREA

Slapton to Tercross is Cowered by Pilots in Three Patrol Tours

CHILBOLTON, Hants-(April 27)-Three practice ground support missions over the Start Bay area from Slapton to Toroross were flown by the equadron today. Practice in the observation of ground activity was the primary purpose of the patrols, each of which were of approximately an hour's length.

Mission number one took off at 0949 and flew the patrol from 1023 until 1131, observing five transports about four miles from shore, two cruisers two miles out and 400 to 500 landing barges shuttling back and forth from the transports. They arrived back at 1215.

The second mission took off at 1552 and landed at 1615, after observing 200 to 250 landing barges, five eargo vessels about five miles out, five troop transports about eight miles out and a large pontoon bridge under construction. Considerable troop activity on the beaches and inland was also noted.

Observed on the day's third mission were hundreds of landing craft, approximately 10 cruisers or destroyers some distance north of the area, troops on the beach, 16 transports in rows of eight formation, and barges shuttling back and forth carrying troops ashore. Also noted was the completion of the pontoon bridge, observed in the construction stages earlier in the day, and trucks and tanks on the beach-head was not noticeably larger. Take off was at 1651; they were down at 2008 and the patrol time was from 1830 to 1930. ** * *
